Ewing Kauffman Book Fund

The Ewing Kauffman Book Fund honors the Kansas City entrepreneur, philanthropist, and community leader Ewing Marion Kauffman. Over the decades the fund has built a collection that comprises high quality works both in content and construction, embodying significant and enduring ideas and ideals. It contains thousands of works in print, media, and electronic formats, including documents, books, images, videos, audiobooks, and audio files.

Origin:

Established in 1991, the Library began a campaign to raise matching funds for a National Endowment for the Humanities grant. The NEH Grant for \$250,000 required a matching local contribution of \$750,000. The initial matching gifts from a group of Kansas City business executives was \$1.2 million. A four-year campaign, which included donations from the public, corporations, Friends of the Library, Library Board of Trustees, and staff raised over \$3 million. Today the endowment fund is \$4.9 million.

The library may withdraw up to 5% annually from the fund, those disbursements are cumulative.

The initial NEH grant required 20% of the annual distributions to go towards humanities programming. These funds are no longer used for programming, they are solely for library materials.

An initial advisory group was established to oversee the fund, which included recommendation of disbursements, monitoring such disbursements, and receiving evaluation reports. In August of 1997, the Library Board of Trustees became the Advisory Committee.

Selection Guidelines:

The selection guidelines are based on the initial application for the NEH grant in 1991.

Earnings from the EKBF will are used to enhance the Library's core collection primarily in the humanities. Preeminent works of enduring value representing a spectrum of views in selected disciplines are chosen for purchase and will serve as a store of knowledge for the community; as a springboard for community discourse; and as an asset for individuals in leading lives that are personally rewarding and contribute in positive ways to the community.

Earnings from the Fund are not to be used to replace or reduce the Library's commitment of funds to purchase library materials.

A minimum of 40% of expenditures from the annual distribution are for humanities related materials.

Selections are made for material that add to the Library's permanent, core collection; materials should not be ephemeral.

Contents of materials purchased are principally informational or enriching for the reader; they should not be principally recreational.

The use of the term "books' should not preclude other types of media.

Materials are owned by the library, either physical or digital, funds may not be expended on subscriptions to digital materials that the library does not own permanent digital rights.

Digital Collections:

Beginning in 2013 Library Collections used the fund to purchase digital content. Twenty-three digital resources that include electronic books, video, media, primary source documents, manuscripts, maps, and encyclopedias are owned by the Library for perpetuity. Staff collaborated closely with multiple vendors to ensure that the library has ownership of these resources whether they are held in a hosted environment or on our own servers.

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Recommendations for future:

Library board of trustees continues as advisory group. Regular updates and requests for distributions presented to the Board Operations committee.

Distributions occur biennially based on availability of funds.

Expenditure of distributions should be completed within two years of approval.

Biennially, in September, using the Library Collections department's ongoing assessment of the collection, both physical and digital, a request for disbursement will be e made to the Library Board of Trustees Operations Committee. Final approval for distributions would come from the entirety of the Library Board.

An annual report of collections activity from the fund will be presented the Operations Committee.
