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Letter from Pete Browne

President, Board of Trustees



Dear Supporters,

This past year was truly one of celebration. Because you're holding our year-end report, it's likely you've been a part of the sesquicentennial anniversary excitement, and I thank you for that.

For 150 years now, the Library has been a critical part of Kansas City's infrastructure both as a safe space to learn, grow, and discover, and as a vibrant cultural center. Our Signature Events, in particular, act as the city's premier public forum for engaging with nationally recognized thinkers, artists, and leaders, and have been showcased during this festive time.

Many of you were with us in December when we kicked off our four-part anniversary speaker series. Each event was very much a party, with live music, food, and activities, and began with Finnish scholar Tommi Laitio who talked about what he calls *convivencia*, a space between harmony and open conflict where strangers can come together. A space like a public library.

We also welcomed and learned from National Book Award winner Jacqueline Woodson and NPR host Ari Shapiro. In September, the series wraps up with a visit from Margaret Atwood, the highly decorated author of *The Handmaid's Tale*, during Banned Books Week.

The Library has been, and remains, a leader in cultivating a city-wide appreciation for the humanities through hosting prominent authors like these but also by continually adding new programs and initiatives.

The Maya Angelou Book Award, for instance, is now in its fourth year. The national award, established by the Kansas City Public Library, the University of Missouri-Kansas City, and five other Missouri universities, celebrates contemporary writers of poetry and fiction whose works reflect a commitment to social justice and inclusion.

And more recently, in partnership with Missouri Humanities and the Missouri Center for the Book, the Heartland Book Festival is fast becoming a favorite yearly event. In fall 2023 the inaugural festival drew 2000 book lovers. The 2024 festival, featuring bestselling author and former Georgia House of Representatives minority leader Stacey Abrams, is likely to bring in even more.

Thank you for taking a moment to pause with me to appreciate an institution that I've benefited from so much over the course of my life – a full third of the Library's 150 years.

To all Library supporters, as well as Library staff and volunteers, I thank you for your dedication and hard work all year long. I'm proud to volunteer alongside you and look forward to seeing you at events for years to come.
